Overview of abstract requirements for AVETRA 2020

Relevance: Abstracts must be about VET, and must be based on research or on rigorous analysis of existing research and/or literature. Abstracts should relate to one of the conference streams (see overleaf). There is a maximum of two abstracts per person. Send your abstract to AVETRA2020@federation.edu.au

Content of abstract: The abstract should include a title, and cover: focus of the paper, the research question, the reason for the research, the method/procedures used in the research and/or rigorous analysis; the significance of the research for knowledge, policy and/or practice; the findings (or findings so far); and three to five references that will be used. It should also state the stream or streams to which the abstract most relates (see below). The authors' names and their institutions should be included at a

Peer review: The abstracts will be blind peer-reviewed by two or more experienced researchers. On-time submissions will receive swift feedback. Selection of abstracts will focus on: the relevance of the topic to VET; whether the paper will make an original and/or innovative contribution to knowledge and/or policy/practice; whether there is a clear research question; whether there is a well-described and appropriate methodology which would lead logically to the findings and conclusions; whether the abstract is well-organised and clearly written; and the use of appropriate literature.

Some guidance notes on writing abstracts will shortly be available on the conference web site via www.avetra.org.au. These will be particularly useful for people writing their first conference abstract.

There will be an opportunity (optional) to submit a full paper to be peer-reviewed. Full papers will be due on March 2nd 2020 and guidelines will be provided.

Streams for abstracts

VET policy perspectives: This stream will include research examining training system/s, including papers on governance, reform, regulation and international frameworks, including the sustainable development goals (SDGs) and other supranational agendas for education.

VET practice perspectives: This stream will include research examining VET pedagogy, curriculum and partnerships, qualifications, the different contexts for VET delivery and for adult learning, industry collaborations, the needs of particular learner groups, the VET workforce and its qualifications, and innovations in practice.

Careers and transitions: This stream will include research examining pathways and transitions between sectors and learning contexts, including transitions from VET to work, from school to VET and school to work, and from VET to higher education and higher education to VET. This would include papers on the status of VET.

Contexts for VET: This stream will include research examining various contextual dimensions that shape VET policy, practice and research, including sustainability, Industry 4.0, workforce development agendas, economic change, regionality and rurality, migration.

Voices of stakeholders: This stream will include papers that illuminate stakeholder voices and attitudes, including learners, teachers, leaders, industry bodies and employers, and bodies representing particular access and equity groups, such as indigenous Australians, people with disabilities and people from CALD backgrounds.

Big data stories: This stream will include papers that draw on big data (e.g. AVETMISS, NCVET collections, ABS, HILDA, LSAY, OECD) to illuminate patterns and trends in Australian and international TVET systems; may include meta-analysis, longitudinal and time-series.

Open theme: This stream will include papers that sits outside the above themes, but are still aligned with the conference theme. It will also include research on VET research itself, including applied research undertaken by VET practitioners and institutional leaders
